#### PLEASE PARTICIPATE: COVID-19 products and company information portal.

We are aware of the constant requests by many sources for different information in different formats re COVID-19. SAMED being one of the 'asker's". And that this is frustrating and time-consuming.

SAMED has worked hard over the last few days to create a live, online, safe and secure portal where the industry can submit their information regarding COVID-19 required products. (Note our previous excel sheets are no longer required). This effort is part of the broader SAMED collaboration with the Minister of Health via Business Unity South Africa's "Business for South Africa" initiative (BSA). During the current pandemic, up-to-date information is critical to ensure all key stakeholders in the value chain make the best-informed decisions at the right time.

The information collected on the covid19manager.co.za platform will be used to ensure supplier verification, regulatory compliance, product availability, reasonable pricing and providing the accurate and most up-to-date logistical information to the procurement department division at BSA to place orders from you and/or assist with ramping up local production. It is an automated process to help facilitate the overwhelming demand currently being experienced in South Africa during the weeks to come. The IDC, the dti, Minister of Health and the BSA procurement team will have access to the data. No data will be shared with other suppliers. SAMED will report to the Minister on the aggregated data.

We are aware that it is extremely difficult for you to secure overseas supply without a confirmed order, however, please be assured that all the products on the portal will be in high demand over the next while. We cannot say exactly how much and so ask your patience in this regard. We will endeavour to keep you updated of the expected need as per attached example.

We have the blessing from the Minister to procure locally first and via trusted credible suppliers. We understand that you may have existing orders in the pipeline promised for other customers, however, we Subscribe Past Issues Translate ▼

See the video for reference as to where to find this code. Please never share or read this code to anyone but only have them read it back to you for validation. **ANSWER:** ITAC import or export permit applications for disaster relief as a result of COVID-19 must be submitted electronically. Exemptions for exports all need to be directed to Marius Collins and Lufuno with the correspondence copied to Mohamed Vawda on all ITAC related issues.

# <u>UPDATED COVID-19 NOTICES, LEGISLATION AND REGULATIONS</u>

## **ITAC Rebate Applications**

Subsequent to our engagement with ITAC, the <u>Standard Operating Procedure (SOP)</u> was amended to make it more user friendly.

The "List of Relevant Tariff Codes", what is termed the "List of Critical Supplies" on ITAC's website, sets forth goods for use in combating the COVID-19 virus. This list was established by ITAC in terms of Rebate Item 412.11 to the Customs and Excise Act, 1964. Only the goods in this list may benefit, subject to a completed and approved application form, from a full rebate of customs duties.

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(ordinary customs duty) or a duty under Schedule 2 (trade remedies customs duties, i.e. anti-dumping, countervailing and safeguard duties) of the Customs and Excise Act, 1964, are not and will not be eligible for inclusion in the List of Critical Supplies (and consequently a full rebate of customs duties)

In terms of what is meant by the condition "party who is not entitled to any privileges", kindly note the following:

Rebate item 412.11 states that goods imported under the rebate item "shall not be sold or disposed of to any party who is not entitled to any privileges under the rebate item". Although the provision allows for limitations to be placed on the party to which goods imported under the rebate item may be sold to or disposed of, currently no such limitations are in place. Consequently, goods imported under rebate item 412.11 may be sold or disposed of to any person (natural or juristic) in South Africa for consumption in South Africa.

Please note that we are trying to expedite the processing of <u>412.11 rebate applications</u> and informs applicants, by copying them in the email Certificate to SARS, as soon as the certificate is issued. However, it would assist greatly if applicant submits one application, which caters for their estimated requirements of all qualifying import goods up until 31 May 2020. This will assist greatly with the administration of the rebate provision.

In addition, the following represents some of the pertinent information required in the application form:

- 1. As per Question 3 of the ITAC application form, kindly confirm whether the statistical unit relating to the quantity applied for in your application is provided in kg or units. It should be noted that quantity applied for should be provided in kg as per SARS statistical unit of measure for HS Code 6307.90.;
- 2. Following from above, the specific volumes (in Kg's) and values (in Rands) in your application should be informed by i.e. off-take orders from buyers or substantiated methodology that supports the volume applied for as well corresponding value; and
- 3. A written undertaking indicating that goods are imported for relief of distress of persons in case of famine or other national disasters.

It should be borne in mind that the validity period of the email certificate's validity period will be from the day that the application was submitted until 31 May 2020, which means that the customs duty will be rebated for any clearances made during that period. It would be more appropriate to await the issuing of a certificate subsequent to lodging an application with ITAC before clearing the goods in question.

However, in exceptional circumstances, it is my understanding that once qualifying applicants, that have submitted their applications under rebate item 412.11, receive their certificate after they have cleared they would be able to approach SARS in terms of dealing with these clearances.

Successful applicants should take note that due to the current lockdown and inaccessibility to certain services, the email (Certificate) serves as the ITAC certificate. ITAC and SARS have agreed that an email (certificate) is all that is required of ITAC to enable an importer to claim a full refund of customs duties. The CIPC attachment to this email Certificate is included in the email to SARS to enable SARS to verify that applicants were approved for participation under rebate item 412.11.

For a VAT exemption, it was agreed that ITAC would issue a global certificate covering the critical goods as listed on ITAC's website, which has been provided to SARS. This global certificate would cover every entry for goods on the essential goods list except for the carve-out that was agreed upon. **Accordingly, no (individual) ITAC certificate is required for a VAT exemption.** 

Please note that ITAC is dealing with applications and queries as fast as they are able.

This includes:

- Hand Sanitisers, Hand Gels, Surface Sanitisers, Antiseptics, Disinfectants and Germicides
- General, Surgical (Medical) Face Masks and Respiratory Protective Devices (Respirators)
- · Surgical, Examination and General Gloves





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## Reserve Bank again cuts repo rate by 1 percentage point

The SA Reserve Bank has cut the repo rate by 100 basis points, or one percentage point. This brings SA's repo rate to 4.25%. The cut will be effective from April 15. This comes after the bank brought the scheduled May meeting of its Monetary Policy Committee forward to respond to the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on SA's economy. The bank's decision will also lower the prime lending rate to 7.75%.

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# **Business For SA Update - Call to pay SMEs**

The extended lockdown will deepen the economic and societal impacts of COVID-19 for South Africans. But the need to prevent loss of life and a surge of infections outweighs the economic consequences. The decision by the President to advance the evaluation of those sectors of the economy that should restart urgently is supported. This will be one of the enablers for a phased recovery as quickly as practically possible.

There are approximately 524 000 formal SME's, employing 6.6 million people in South Africa. Given the lockdown, the vast majority are unable to pay their rental, utilities, and importantly their employees. Initial surveys bear this out: 60% of SMEs are considering retrenching employees or already have (Sasfin and SME Africa survey). This is a significant threat to the SA economy, with many millions of jobs at risk. BSA therefore call on all corporates and government to pay their SME creditors by Monday, 20 April 2020. **Read the full update** <a href="here">here</a>.

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#### **COVID-19 DEVELOPMENTS**

#### TRACKING THE PANDEMIC

- South Africa has recorded an increase of 143 more COVID-19 infections, bringing the total to 2
  415 confirmed cases on Tuesday afternoon. No new deaths were confirmed, meaning the death
  toll remains at 27.
- Twelve staff members, including seven healthcare workers, have tested positive for the coronavirus at Mediclinic Morningside in Sandton, the private hospital group has confirmed. It is trying to identify all staff, doctors and patients who have potentially been exposed. The hospital will disinfect areas which are considered to be a risk and have put in place an access control policy, which will also affect emergency admissions. This comes after Netcare St Augustine's Hospital in KZN has been closed to all new patients following an outbreak which saw 47 staff members test positive for the virus. Five have died of coronavirus.

## **ECONOMIC AND OTHER RESPONSES TO THE PANDEMIC**

- The South African Reserve Bank (SARB) has <u>cut its repo rate by another 100 basis points, taking it to 4.25% a record low</u>. And it now sees the South African economy contracting 6.1% in 2020 the biggest loss of output since the Great Depression. The Reserve Bank is clearly concerned about the growth of bad loans and debt for households and companies that have lost income and revenue streams to the lockdown, compromising their ability to make timely repayments.
- The government has told the SAA business rescue practitioners that it is unable to provide the airline with further funding, portending its imminent death or at best an orderly winding down. It

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Daliks. SA Expless, also state-owned, is ill liquidation.

- Many African countries have introduced lockdowns in order to halt the spread of coronavirus, but, as <u>Alex de Waal and Paul Richards argue</u>, <u>ordinary people have to be involved in choosing the solutions</u> that will work for them. Public health officials developed a useful guide during the Aids epidemic: "Know your epidemic, know your response, and act on its politics." It is useful to think of COVID-19 not as a single global pandemic, but as a simultaneous outbreak of innumerable local epidemics, each one slightly different.
- US President Donald Trump cut off funding to the World Health Organization, accusing the UN body of mishandling the coronavirus crisis and of "severely mismanaging and covering up the spread of the coronavirus." The US contributed \$400 million to the WHO last year.
- Anthony Fauci, head of the US National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, said public
  health officials must be able to test for the virus quickly, isolate new cases and track down new
  infections before social-distancing restrictions can be eased. Trump's administration has floated 1
  May as a possible date to start reopening some areas. Fauci said that date may be "a bit overly
  optimistic."

#### CLINICAL, SCIENCE AND NEWS ON THE SOCIAL ASPECTS OF THE PANDEMIC

- During yesterday's <u>Business for South Africa media briefing</u> speakers warned that the country has about four weeks' worth of stock left for frontline medical staff and other essential health workers.
   The other gaps left include:
  - o 11 million aprons
  - o 160,000 goggles or face shields
  - 5 million biohazard bags
  - o 22 million gowns
  - o 10 million N95 respirators
  - o 21 million surgical masks for health-care workers.
- GSK and Sanofi, two of the world's biggest pharmaceuticals, are joining forces to try and create a
   vaccine to stop the spread of COVID-19. Even if it is successful, the vaccine will not be ready until
   the second half of next year. GSK CE Emma Walmsley promised that the company would not
   show any net profit from vaccine sales and along with future research investment, GSK would use
   any profits to subsidise vaccine deliveries to developing countries.
- GSK, Sanofi and 13 other life sciences companies like BD and Boehringer Ingelheim have also
  joined the global <u>Therapeutic Accelerator</u> initiated by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. As a
  first step, the companies have agreed to share their proprietary libraries of molecular compounds
  that already have some degree of safety and activity data and quickly screen them for potential
  use against COVID-19. Successful hits would move rapidly into in vivo trials in as little as two
  months.


If we reach more than 90 new cases per day, lockdown will continue.
