The current situation is very fluid, and applicable laws change in a matter of hours through ordinances, decrees and other emergency legislative mechanisms.

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NRCS CMM - Sales Permit for Masks

For Sales Permit:

Please complete the application for sales permit fully. The table is compulsory, the non-compliance is that the KN/N95 masks are not approved as required. Your motivation as to why we need to issue a sales permit for your product. If you have test reports (in English) to the standards mentioned, please submit and information for the user. All photographic evidence of mask and packaging, we need to see clearly all the markings on both mask and packaging.

For full homologation:

Please find application forms for homologation of masks. If you have test reports to the standards mentioned, please submit and information for the user. All photographic evidence of mask and packaging.

In the wake of the Covid-19 and the resultant shortage, we are considering a Sale permit route for temporary approval. We will still need test reports to prove compliance. We have agreed with the test laboratories in the country to, as a minimum, FFP2 perform the following tests:

- · Total inward leakage
- Particle penetration;
- Breathing resistance;
- Flammability;
- Practical performance (check face fit and comfortability)

For N95/KN95 masks, NRCS will test according to above, SANS 50149 and EN 14683. And will need to be licenced by SAHPRA for medical/health sector use. NRCS selected the most critical tests for the different products. This is only a temporary agreement with manufacturers and distributors, therefore after this critical period, they must ensure the full testing of their products for approval (homologation).

NB: Kindly note that the type of mask, the intention of the masks, the environment in which mask is used

classified as Class A medical devices with sterility and require the establishment (manufacturer, distributor) to be licensed with SAHPRA under Act 101. In addition, compliance to SANS1866 is mandatory. If the mask is not making claims to protection of viruses or being used by medical personnel and is specifically for civilian use, which should be specifically labelled as such, then these fall outside the mandate of SAHPRA and the NRCS regulations.

If a medical mask is indicated on the label, the SANS1866 standard must be complied with can be tested by Protechnik for compliance.

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CEE Letter to designated employers on the impact of COVID-19

The Commission for Employment Equity (CEE) recognises the catastrophic impact of the COVID-19 on the various sectors of the economy and acknowledges the fact that it will be business will be exploring various COVID-19 Response and Recovery Plans with regard to Business Continuity.

In response to the inevitable consequences of the COVID-19 on organisations and in particular, on the implementation of employment equity in the various workplaces, the CEE request all designated employers to take into account the following guidelines:

- All employers are reminded that they are still legally obligated to comply with all the provisions of all employment laws during their organisational restructuring/ configuration processes to ensure that there is no unfair treatment and unfair discrimination policies and practices against all employees.
- 2. All designated employers are requested to strive not to reverse the previously attained transformation gains, including to where reasonably practical, achieve their initially planned annual EE targets for 2020. In instances that it is practically not possible to maintain and achieve the initially planned EE targets, the employers may consider reviewing and amending their EE Plans in consultation with the EE Consultative Forums (Sections 16)
- 3. All designated employers are still required to submit their annual EE Reports as prescribed by Section 21 of the EEA and the EE Regulations, 2014 from 1 September 2020 until 15 January 2021. This EE data is critical in assessing the impact of the COVID-19 on the transformation agenda of the labour market and society as a whole. There is no legal provision for exemptions, condonations or appeals in the EEA for submission of EE Reports.
- 4. However, in instances where the designated employer is unable to submit an EE Report as per Section 21 of the EEA, such an employer must notify the Director-General of Department of Employment and Labour in writing with reasons before the last working day of August of 2020 as prescribed by Section 21(4A) of the EE Amendment Act, 2013 and the EEA14 form in the EE Regulations, 2014. The reasons that can be advanced as per the EEA14 form, include Section 197 of the LRA; Mergers/ Acquisitions; Labour Court Order; Liquidations/ Judicial Winding; Insolvency; and Other reasons (e.g. employer no longer designated because of size and/ turnover, or company closed down because of retrenchments, or company under business rescue, etc.).

All completed EEA14 forms must be accompanied by supporting documents as proof and must be emailed to ntsoaki.mamashela@labour.gov.za; lucia.rayner@labour.gov.za; tshillio.siobo@labour.gov.za; before the last working day of August 2020. 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

The loan guarantee scheme is an initiative to provide loans, guaranteed by the government, to businesses with an annual turnover of less than R300 million to meet some of their operational expenses. Funds borrowed through this scheme can be used for operational expenses such

B4SA partner with EMGuidance to drive digital COVID-19 resource platform for HCPs

Business for South Africa's Health Workgroup has partnered with Essential Medical Guidance (EMGuidance), the country's largest free digital health care platform and community, which has launched a dedicated COVID-19 Support Channel for South African health care professionals (HCPs) in both the public and private sectors.



The COVID-19 platform will provide four key support and resource channels:

- Clinical Updates Channel: providing the latest South African COVID-19 clinical information, including National Department of Health (NDoH) alerts, digital guidelines, COVID-19 medicines information, local care coordination such as the location of COVID-19 testing sites, information on accessing and using personal protective equipment (PPE), and links to other critical clinical applications;
- 2. Mental Health Support Channel: Support and access to mental health support, through the South Africa Society of Psychiatrists (SASOP), the South African Medical Association (SAMA), the South African Society of Anaesthesiologists (SAMA), the Psychological Society of South Africa (PsySSA) and the South African Depression and Anxiety Group (SADAG). EMGuidance will serve as a dedicated channel to survey and monitor the mental health status of South Africa's health care community. It will also be used to disseminate mental health care content, and provide access to professional mental health support.
- 3. **Practice Business Support Channel**: Providing business resources, including advice on taxation, accounting and labour relations. This is provided in partnership with practice management companies and financial institutions; and
- 4. **COVID-19 Chatbot**: A dedicated machine learning chatbot which provides information based on NDoH guidelines and local care coordination information. In addition, a specialist pharmacologist is available online to provide guidance on COVID-related medicines queries.



- There have been calls on the President to address the nation regularly at least once a week –
 and that these briefings should include the opportunity to answer questions from the media (Daily
 Maverick)
- Schools' state of readiness to reopen during the Level 4 lockdown hangs in the balance yet again as teacher unions continue to raise what they call "gaps" in an updated report received from the Department of Basic Education.
- Government interventions, including the travel ban and lockdown, have potentially averted at least 20 000 deaths, says Professor Tulio de Oliviera, a bioinformatician and director of the KwaZulu-Natal Research and Innovation Sequencing Platform (Krisp) at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. The basic reproductive number of the infection has also slowed from three to two in most of the country.
- De Oliveira and his team at Krisp have provided real-time data analysis of the COVID-19 infection to the government. He said South Africa had followed the UK trajectory in the early days of the epidemic, but early intervention by the government had seen the two countries charting different paths (Fin24)

Interesting retail trends

- South Africa's lockdown has led to some interesting retail trends like a spike in the sale of non-alcoholic beverages, and pineapples. Shoprite/Checkers and Pick n Pay supermarkets saw a "major spike" in the sale of bleach and other household cleaning products which the group attributes to an increased interest in hygiene, and additionally more time to do some home spring cleaning.
- According to Pick n Pay's annual results presentation, released on Tuesday, bleach was one of the most commonly stockpiled items - the sales of which grew by 138%. The group also reported a 92% increase in hair colouring kits during lockdown (Business Insider)

Competition commission

- The Competition Commission has referred two face mask suppliers to the Competition Tribunal for allegedly charging "astronomically" high prices on face masks. The suppliers, Sicuro Safety and Hennox Supplies, allegedly charged more than 969.07% and 956% respectively, for face masks, an investigation by the Commission found.
- The Commission has referred the matter to the Tribunal to impose penalties and to prohibit thee suppliers from charging excessive prices. It previously investigated Babelegi Workwear and Industrial Suppliers as well as Dis-Chem Pharmacies for excessive pricing of face masks. The Tribunal is yet to announce a decision on the Dis-Chem matter (Fin24)

Tourism industry

• There will be "nothing left" of South Africa's tourism industry if it is only able to start operating in general again in December - as seems likely in light of current coronavirus projections - Tshifhiwa

for more than 700 000 people by 2019. The industry has been decimated by travel and movement restrictions imposed by in an attempt to curb the spread of the pandemic.

 South Africa's domestic tourism season will likely only start in December and international tourism only next year, <u>Minister of Tourism Mmamoloko Kubayi-Ngubane recently indicated</u> during an online briefing hosted by SA Tourism (News24)

CLINICAL & SCIENCE NEWS

- Cape Bio Pharms is using biotechnology to manufacture COVID-19 proteins in plants. These proteins, called antigens, are used in rapid diagnostic test kits that detect antibodies against the virus in a person's blood, indicating whether they have been exposed to the virus. But these test kits won't be rolled out on mass scale in South Africa just yet. The test kit manufacturers are struggling to secure a supply of positive serum, blood from COVID19 positive people, to test whether the kits work and are still waiting on approval from the South African Health Products Regulatory Authority.
- Tanzania says it has received its first shipment of Madagascar's self-proclaimed, plant-based "cure" for coronavirus, despite warnings from the World Health Organization that its efficacy is unproven. The Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention also said the drink should be "tested rigorously". Health specialists are worried that people who drink the product might feel they are immune to COVID-19 and engage in risky behaviour, the WHO's Africa head Matshidiso Moeti said. "We are concerned that touting this product as a preventive measure might then make people feel safe," she said.
