DO YOU HAVE A COVID-19 QUESTION OR QUERY?

Please visit the FAQ Section of our library as it provides answers to many of the frequently asked questions we receive.

QUESTION: Can I have duties on COVID-19 products wavered? If so, where do I apply?

ANSWER: Duties have been wavered in favour of reducing the cost associated with importing medical technology critical to the prevention, testing and management of COVID-19 in South Africa. The Department of Trade, Industry and Competition has made a provision of rebate item 412.11 for goods imported for the relief of distress. Should your import item be listed as a remedy for critical medical supplies for COVID-19, you can download a rebate application from the ITAC website for a duties rebate.

This Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) acts as a guideline for Business in importing critical supplies into South Africa under Rebate Item 412.11. Importantly, rebate item 412.11' means the full rebate of custom duties and VAT exemption on the critical supplies during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Kindly note that a permit application for critical medical supplies as listed on ITAC's website must be submitted electronically to the following officials: For goods classifiable under Chapter 1 to 68:

It should also be noted that the relevant application form requires among others, specific volumes and values, which should be informed by i.e. offtake orders or substantiated methodology that supports the volume applied for as well corresponding value. It would therefore not be a blanket permit for a prolonged period of time. Be sure to put shipping dates or urgency in the subject field to aid ITAC in prioritising their efforts. Should you require more clarity you are at liberty to contact the relevant officials mentioned above.

ANSWER: ITAC import or export permit applications for disaster relief as a result of COVID-19 must be submitted electronically. Exemptions for exports all need to be directed to Marius Collins and Lufuno with the correspondence copied to Mohamed Vawda on all ITAC related issues.

UPDATED COVID-19 NOTICES, LEGISLATION AND REGULATIONS

Amended Department of Labour COVID-19 TERS Directive

On 26 March 2020, The Minister of Employment and Labour issued out a <u>directive</u> that determined that it is necessary to implement steps through the Covid19 Temporary Employee / Employer Relief Scheme to prevent an escalation of the COVID -19 infections funded through the National Disaster Benefit. The purpose of this Directive is to make provision for the:

- 1. Payment of benefits to the Contributors who have lost income due to the COVID -19 pandemic
- 2. Minimise economic impact of loss of employment because of the pandemic
- 3. Avoid contact and contain the spread of COVID -19 during the process of application for benefit
- 4. Establish the Temporary Employee /Employer Relief Scheme and set out the application process for benefits of the COVID -19 pandemic.

On 8 April 2020, The Minister of Employment and Labour issued out an amendment of the abovementioned directive.

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Final clarity: UIF claims and remuneration during Lockdown

Following the issuing of an amendment to the TERS fund, the major unanswered question regarding the amount an employer can pay an

an employee who will also receive the UIF benefit has been clarified.

Some Practical recommendations:

- It is noted that the term "salary" and "remuneration" are used interchangeably in the Gazette. It is recommended that the remuneration recorded in monthly returns as identified in your payroll system be used. The basic remuneration, excluding commission, allowances and the like.
- Should an employer be in a position to remunerate an employee for a period (typically a month) but would also like to receive the COVID-19 benefit from UIF, the employer should consider the scale of benefits from 60% of the remuneration for employees who earn in excess R 3 500.00 to 38% for employees who earn R 17 712.00 (i.e. R 6 730.56).
- If an employee's remuneration is less than R 3 500.00, the UIF payment will be R 3 500.00.
- For employees earning equal to or in excess of R 17 712.00 the maximum amount that may be claimed will be R 6 730.56.
- We again reiterate that the UIF senior officials have advised us verbally that employers should continue to remunerate employees if they are in a position to do so. They advise that such advance payments may be set off against the payment received from the UIF.
- The UIF has advised that due to the numerous applications for TERS it may take some time for employers to receive this relief.



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

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Implementation of the Preparedness and Upscaling Plan

The National Health Laboratory Service (NHLS) is a public health laboratory service with laboratories across South Africa. The NHLS is the largest public health laboratory service with more than 233 laboratories across the nine provinces. When the volume of reference testing started growing and the first positive case was detected, the NHLS started testing in the NHLS laboratories. The NHLS had capacitated itself through the procurement of state of the art equipment in Virology laboratories in the country.

The NHLS has done a review of the capacity it will have to implement the rollout of the COVID-19 testing programme. Both currently and in the future, the NHLS will have sufficient capacity to successfully implement the programme. The NHLS has requested that the provinces scale up its screening and referrals for testing. The NHLS management team had to work under extremely difficult conditions, in the face of global shortages and competition for equipment, to rapidly provide a service to manage the campaign. The current stages of SA's COVID-19 response are as follows:

Stage 1: Preparation

Stage 2: Primary prevention

Stage 3: Lockdown

Stage 4: Surveillance & active case-finding

Community transmission levels will guide the next steps & the lockdown. By 18 April the government will know if community transmission interpretation is accurate. It is expected for large daily variations & some increases in positive tests due to active case-finding (passive vs active cases). An abrupt return may increase spread and so there will need to be a plan for the systematic easing of the lockdown over several days.

Stage 5: Hotspots

Stage 6: Medical Care (for the peak)



TRACKING THE PANDEMIC

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SA's unique Covid-19 trajectory, and how the government is attacking the outbreak

Presenting a detailed analysis of the South African coronavirus outbreak and expected phases of the pandemic at a public engagement meeting with Health Minister Zweli Mkhize, Professor Salim Abdool Karim, chair of the ministerial advisory group on COVID-explained what might happen after the lockdown. The coming week is "critical" for the government's COVID-19 fight because the number of positive cases that are found during intensive testing will guide the government's next move. South Africa might still see an exponential increase in COVID-19 once the lockdown is lifted. Karim said the lockdown has been effective in delaying transmissions and easing the burden on our healthcare facilities. "What we would hope for is that the number of new cases will steadily decline, and it will disappear and that's the end of the story. I'm sorry to tell you, but that's very unlikely," Karim said.

RESPONSES TO THE PANDEMIC

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENTS


With many restaurants and other areas of the hospitality industry effectively shut for business, food producers are warning they actually have too much stock which will now go to waste. For example, with coffee shops closed completely in some countries, **oversupply of milk** is emerging as a real side-effect of the pandemic. Dairy Farmers of America, the country's biggest dairy co-operative, is estimating that farmers are having to dump 3.7 million gallons (14 million litres) of milk every single day because of disrupted supply routes. On the other hand, some parts of the food industry are benefiting from changing consumption habits – such as the US sales of orange juice, which had been on a gradual decline, are said to be up 38% on last year's figures.

The **Gauteng Liquor Forum** which is comprised about 20 000 township shebeens and taverns wrote a letter to Cyril Ramaphosa at the weekend detailing why they should be permitted to sell alcohol on a limited basis and to relax the total ban on alcohol sales or face court action. The President is given until today to respond.

The <u>air travel industry</u> records significant drop in flights worldwide, and looks at what air travel might look like after the coronavirus pandemic.
