MEMBER FEEDBACK: DISCUSSION WITH NETCARE ON TESTING OF MEDICAL **REPRESENTATIVES**

A SAMED delegation met with Netcare senior management representatives today to discuss the rationale and requirements outlined in the recent communication regarding restricted representative access and COVID-19 screening and testing of medical representatives protocol.

SAMED proposed enforcing stringent screening protocols for representatives as well as formalised training on the correct use of PPE aligned with the CRICE Course. In addition, representatives and technical assistants to only be allowed in theatre at the express request of the surgeon.

In terms of the required 7-day testing protocol, the scientific evidence for this was challenged. SAMED raised concerns with regard to practical implementation, testing capacity, test resource constraints both current and future, cost, timelines and the need for consistency of the approach across all stakeholders.

Netcare indicated that their risk mitigation warranted the use of these tests. The 7-day testing protocol will remain in place at this stage, however, Netcare is prepared to consider a risk categorisation for medical representatives and technicians depending on which hospital department they visit. SAMED will draft this categorisation in the interim for consideration.

The meeting was constructive and all relevant points raised and discussed. Netcare has assured us they will communicate our concerns with their Executive team and revert once they have discussed the matter further internally.

SAMED will continue to engage as a matter of urgency with Netcare, clinical experts, surgical associations and our international counterpart associations on this matter to ensure that our members' interests are taken into account and that a pragmatic, fact-based mutually agreed solution is arrived at.



EXCLUSION OF MEDICINES, MEDICAL DEVICES AND IN VITRO DIAGNOSTICS (IVDs) DONATED TO THE STATE FROM THE OPERATION OF CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE MEDICINES AND RELATED SUBSTANCES ACT

Dr Zwelini Mkhize, the Minister of Health, has published an exclusion on medicines, medical devices and in-vitro diagnostics donated to the State, or provided to the State as a sample as part of the submission of a bid for a tender published by the State, from provisions of section 18B of the Act: Provided that such donations are made or samples provided in accordance with the guidelines as determined by the Authority and relevant procedures required by the State.

This exemption shall be effective immediately for a period not exceeding three years from the date of signature of this Notice.

B4SA UPDATE: IMPORTANT UPDATE FOR EMPLOYERS ON TERS

There has been a change in the process for applying for the UIF TERS benefit for on behalf of employees from May, in terms of which employers have a new option.

First, however, it appears that the UIF site is not yet ready to accommodate applications for May. We are trying to establish when this will become possible.

As to changes, employers applying will be able to indicate whether the benefits should be paid to the company or whether payment must be made directly into employees' bank accounts.

Employers will be entitled to receive a payment if they require a refund from the UIF, which would be the case where the employer has paid the benefit to the employees, or where the employees have been required to take annual leave. In other circumstances, the UIF will make payment directly to the employees.

The addition of this second option, under instruction from the Minister of Employment and Labour, follows complaints that some employers did not make the April payments to employees within the required 48 hours. While we have not been told how many employers failed to do this, or how many employees were affected, the non-compliance of a few drew comments from the Minister and the changes to the system.

The additional option has essentially been introduced with the intention of ensuring that the payments of the Unemployment Income Covid19 TERS benefits are smoother for May and June. Representatives of the UIF have informed us that they are confident that the Unemployment Income system has the capacity to pay individual employees directly. They further confirmed that processes are in place to inform employees once the payment has been made into their bank account. Employers will also be informed when an employee has been paid and how much.

Employers who have not submitted employee bank account details and mobile numbers to the UI when they initially applied should add the relevant details to their May applications. Employers who did so for April will not need to do so again.

It will still be necessary for the employer (or, where applicable, the bargaining council) to apply for the benefit on behalf of employees to whom the benefit is due. Where employers refuse or fail to do so, employees may apply directly.

Employers can also still make an advance payment to employees to ensure that they receive the amount on their regular pay date. In this case, the employer will need to indicate that they are applying for a refund when they make the application, and the amount will then be paid to the employer.

Please note that the UIF has indicated that many employers who received benefits for April have not yet provided the UIF with proof that the employees have been paid their April entitlements. Employers signed MOAs committing to send proof that they have paid their employees. B4SA thanks those who have complied. Those who have not yet submitted proof to the UIF are urged to do so.

Employers who have not received funds for April are asked to escalate this to the UIF call centre, but the UIF has also undertaken to contact employers directly to resolve any outstanding issues so that workers can get paid.

The Department says it has engaged the private sector, insurance sector, banking sector and other stakeholders to assist in making the application process more effective and efficient. The Department aims to launch a new web platform, which will automate the applications value chain and speed up the



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OVERVIEW - SOUTH AFRICA AND GLOBAL FIGURES

- Projections by a consortium of experts advising the government have been clarified to show that 12 million to 13 million Covid-19 infections could have cumulatively occurred in the country by November, of which only roughly 3.7 million will be detected.
- Peak infection is expected to occur between early-July (pessimistic, 1.2 million cases) and mid-August (optimistic, 1 million cases), according to the consortium's model.
- The total number of detected cases would be around 3.7 million to 3.9 million cases by November, a report by the consortium published on the <u>National Institute for Communicable Diseases</u> (NICD's) website
- Projected need for ICU beds is between 20 000 and 35 000 between June and November, and 500 by the end of May.
- General hospital beds required are expected to be between 75 000 and 90 000 between June and November, with just more than 2 000 beds required by the end of May.

Cape Town hot spots

- Five areas within the Cape Town metro have been identified as "hot spots" by the Western Cape government. The province has recorded over 11 000 cases of the virus as at 13:00 on Thursday. Deaths in the province stood at 235, though 5 677 people had recovered from the virus. Most of the cases in the province are among essential service workers, such as in the retail sector, and the projections by the province's experts are that 90% of people will have no or mild symptoms. It is hoping to manage those cases through self-isolation and quarantine where possible, assisting those who do not need to go to hospital with self-management, unless otherwise necessary. The hot spots identified so far are:
 - Tygerberg
 - Khayelitsha
 - Klipfontein
 - o Western Du Noon
 - Southern Hout Bay

Professor Gray debate continues

- Health minister Dr Zweli Mkhize has hit out at Professor Glenda Gray, a South African physician and scientist over her comments around the country's nationwide lockdown, saying that she made "factually incorrect and unfounded statements".
- He said, "we will keep emphasising this: as government we do not claim to have it all figured out
 when it comes to Covid-19. No country does. The president has constantly and correctly stated
 that we are in uncharted waters. But we are committed to doing everything in our powers to protect
 the lives of our citizens."

Schools re-opening

- The Gauteng Department of Education says it expects 300 000 Grade 7 and 12 pupils back when schools reopen on 1 June. Education MEC Panyaza Lesufi speaking at the province's weekly Coronavirus Command Council briefing on Thursday said that before the reopening can take place, health protocols will have to be met by all schools.
- The MEC said, in order for schools to be ready, it will need to have all the necessary personal
 protective equipment (PPEs) for pupils, while classrooms need to meet the necessary standards
 for physical distancing.
- Schools will be allocated more than R15 000 each to start deep cleaning in preparation for 1 June, after which officials from the district will inspect the premises to observe whether it is ready or not.

The battle against Covid-19 in SA's mines

- Mines are facing a devastating scenario. Barely a month after a limited return to production, infections have started rolling in, sparking anxiety among executives and unions alike.
- On Tuesday, the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy published guidelines for a mandatory Code of Practice for the mitigation and management of Covid-19 in the mining industry.

them at high risk of getting infected with the coronavirus away from work as the industry returns to production.

"Covid-19 is potentially a manageable challenge, but it is more challenging in an environment such
as mining," said David Rees, Emeritus Professor Occupational Medicine and Epidemiology at the
University of the Witwatersrand. But the mining environment makes it particularly difficult to adhere
to practical safety protocols, such as physical distancing and regular washing of hands, while
working deep underground and chasing production targets.

Global lockdown restrictions have cut carbon emissions by 17%

- Daily global **carbon emissions** fell by about one-sixth during the coronavirus pandemic, researchers say. But it's not likely to last.
- "Population confinement has led to drastic changes in energy use and CO2 emissions. These
 extreme decreases are likely to be temporary though, as they do not reflect structural changes in
 the economic, transport or energy systems," said study leader Corinne Le Quéré, of the University
 of East Anglia in Norwich, England.
- Worldwide, daily emissions fell by 17% or 17 million metric tons of carbon dioxide during the
 peak of the pandemic confinement measures in early April, compared to average daily levels in
 2019, the researchers found.
- Economic stimulus packages after the pandemic must not make future carbon emissions higher by delaying new green initiatives or weakening emissions standards, Le Quéré and her colleagues warned.

Wuhan bans eating of wild animals

- Wuhan has banned the eating of wild animals, with officials declaring the city a "wildlife sanctuary."
 Neighbouring Hunan and Jiangxi have announced plans to stop farmers from breeding exotic animals, with cash offered for current stock.
- China's fur trade will continue, though, and wild animals can still be reared for medicine, entertainment, and scientific research, according to Reuters.
- The new measures are part of China's efforts to stem the transmission of zoonotic diseases from animals to humans

CLINICAL AND SCIENTIFIC

SA facing 'significant constraints' with Covid-19 test kits

- South Africa faces significant constraints with testing kits for Covid-19, Parliament's health committees heard on Wednesday evening.
- The Department of Health's deputy director-general for communicable and non-communicable diseases, prevention, treatment and rehabilitation, Yogan Pillay, said because of a "global scramble for test kits", suppliers' inability to provide enough kits and locked down airports, there were "significant constraints" with tests kits. "We need to be a bit more selective with who we test," he said.

Mask industry

- In the first quarter of this year, South Africa's normally staid and insignificant mask industry exploded.
- Customs data released by the Department of Trade, Industry and Competition shows a
 spectacular surge, starting in January and continuing into the state of disaster declared in March.
 As a baseline, back in the first quarter of 2019, South Africa exported medical and industrial face
 masks worth roughly R58 million. Fast forward to the first three months of 2020 and exports were
 worth nearly 10 times that, R524 million to be exact.

Hand sanitizer

- Some South Africans are reporting rashes from exposure to hand sanitiser dispensed at store entrances.
- There are concerns that some of these products may not include the right kind of alcohol and the
 wrong mix of emollients. To avoid these problems, arm yourself with your own sanitiser. The surge
 in demand for sanitiser means companies are turning to new manufacturers to provide the
 products. The industry isn't regulated, and questions are being asked about the ingredients of
 some of the hand sanitiser aimed for mass use.
