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

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NVP (NATIONAL VENTILATOR PROJECT) STREAM 2

This is a Request for Information (RFI) to identify role players to assist the South African Radio Astronomy Observatory (SARAO), who has been mandated by the Minister of Trade, Industry and Competition to manage the process in the National Ventilator Project (NVP) Stream 2. The RFI follows on an earlier Call for proposals (CFP) for CPAP ventilators, which was published in April. The objective of this call was to meet the anticipated demand for simple, low-cost ventilators that can be rapidly produced, certified and deployed in large numbers, in order to treat the majority of hospitalised COVID-19 patients.

This is at an advanced stage of development and this RFI is designed to be complementary thereto. The objective of the Stream 2 Project is to establish a support or incubation program to meet the anticipated ventilator demand for the treatment of a smaller number of critically ill patients. The Minister of Trade, Industry and Competition, therefore, invites submissions to be made to SARAO relating to the design, development, certification and production of ventilators and supporting

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advanced than the ventilators produced in first call, namely:

- Bi-level Positive Airway Pressure (BPAP) non-invasive Ventilator System (BVS), and
- Invasive Ventilator System (IVS)

Due to the more advanced nature of these devices and the likely inclusion of electronic control, it is expected that certification will be more challenging than for STREAM 1 devices.

Several members have contact SAMED about companies trading medical technologies without a SAHPRA Medical Device Establishment License. These companies are trading illegally and it is essential that they be reported to SAHPRA for investigation.

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COVID-19 DEVELOPMENTS

TRACKING THE PANDEMIC



The World Health Organisation said this week that the coronavirus **pandemic situation was worsening around the globe**, as it warned against complacency. The WHO said it had recorded its highest daily tally of new infections, with COVID-19 raging in the Americas. WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said more than 100 000 cases have been reported on nine of the past 10 days. He said that almost 75% of cases recorded on 7 June came from 10 countries - mostly in the Americas and South Asia. The WHO also issued a guide (see graphic below) on how to correctly use non-medical/cloth masks.



ECONOMICS, POLITICS, EDUCATION, ENVIRONMENT, SOCIAL

- New COVID-19 labour-related regulations make it possible for employees who have been diagnosed with the virus to return to work without testing negative for the virus. This is one of the amendments Labour and Employment Minister Thulas Nxesi has made to alleviate pressure on laboratories. According to the new directives, an employee who contracted the virus can return to work after spending 14 days in guarantine provided a medical evaluation confirms they are fit for work.
- Minister of Higher Education, Science and Innovation Dr Blade Nzimande addressed the media in Pretoria yesterday (9 June) on the state of readiness for the phased return of students at universities and TVET colleges. He said that his department had been engaging with National Treasury on the procurement of learning devices, particularly laptops, for students funded by the National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS). Minister Nzimande urged higher education institutions to follow the national guidelines when deciding on the return of students, especially at student residences. Measures include that all students and staff, approximately two million people, are required to register for the HealthCheck app - an initiative launched by HIGHER HEALTH as a daily screening and monitoring tool for the higher education sector - and use it every day to assess their own level of risk prior to entering campuses. - Analyst Alex Van den Heever from the Wits School of Governance argues in the Daily Maverick that government only appears to be transparent about COVID-19 strategies including the lockdown and progress of trace/test and scaling up bed capacity for critically ill. In his opinion, "... matters of substance are carefully avoided or fobbed off."

CLINICAL, SCIENTIFIC

 People with TB and HIV have a two to three-fold increased risk of dying of COVID-19, according to data released by the Western Cape health department. Although the data shows an

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one in 10 fatalities from the new coronavirus was due to being HIV positive and 2% were due to having active TB, departmental public health medicine specialist Mary-Ann Davies announced during a webinar. "[Until now] we haven't known whether we should consider people with HIV as being at higher risk [for COVID-19] or not," said Davies. "So we should consider them as a risk			s

many deaths among people living with HIV occurred in those with <u>other underlying health</u> <u>conditions</u>, such as diabetes, obesity, high blood pressure and asthma/chronic respiratory conditions.

• According to the latest research published in the Annals of Internal Medicine, the <u>odds of a false</u> <u>negative through RT-PCR, the most commonly used test [nasal swab], is one in five</u>. Further research from the Geisel Medical School of Dartmouth suggests that even more emphasis should be placed on addressing these inaccuracies, as testing is crucial to containing the pandemic. According to lead author, Prof Steve Woloshin from the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth and of the Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical practice, there are two ways in which the current diagnostic tests, which involve a swab from the nasal passage, can be inaccurate: "A false-positive result mistakenly labels a person infected, with consequences including unnecessary quarantine and contact tracing. [Secondly], false-negative results are far more consequential because infected persons who might be asymptomatic may not be isolated and can infect others," he stated in a news release.
